

St Andrew's Manse 14th February 2024

Dear friends,

A new year calls us to look back. The year 2024 reminds us of the eightieth anniversary of the D-Day landings and the sacrifice of many for our nation's identity and our Christian rights and responsibilities and the liberties afforded to many. We enter another year as we emerge from the aftermath of lockdowns, which have really done more harm than good. Yet, it can also give us the opportunity to consider who and what is important to us. It is hard to think that life has changed so much in the last four years – and not for the better. Yet it is nothing compared to what our young men endured – and still continue to endure in our theatres of conflict. The years of 1939-1945 also saw an enormous change in our country.

The issue of liberty is a huge one in Scotland at present. Thomas Jefferson, the third President of the USA has the following quote attributed to him: The price of liberty is eternal vigilance'. This was true at the beginning of the nineteenth century and is very true today.

The Scottish Government consultation on so-called 'conversion therapy' is one that needs eternal vigilance for Christian liberty. 'Conversion therapy' is a wide umbrella term chosen by LGBTTQQUIA+ campaigners. It covers abusive practices by quack medical practitioners and charlatan preachers which are largely illegal already. But campaigners want to go much further and criminalise repentance as well as preaching, prayer, pastoral care and even parenting that fails to endorse liberal theology.

As Christians we believe that all people are made in the image of God with inherent dignity and worth. There are some practices conducted by pseudo-medical practitioners and some false preachers that are harmful to those struggling with issues of sexual orientation and gender identity. We oppose all abusive practises and reject the idea that anyone can be forced to live a certain lifestyle. However, the term 'conversion therapy' is too broad and confusing to be useful. A major concern is that other practices might be inadvertently criminalised in the process of 'ending conversion therapy'.

The ban threatens to criminalise Christians who offer prayer and pastoral support to members of their congregation. A proposed broad ban threatens our rights to freedom of expression and belief.

There is no medical consensus on the best way to help people who identify as transgender. The recent legal cases over the Tavistock clinic in London have shown the controversy and complexity of the issues involved. NHS England are currently conducting an independent review into gender identity services for children and young people, which includes an

examination of the issues surrounding children and young people who are prescribed puberty blocking and cross sex hormone drugs.

In Europe, Sweden has ended the prescription of hormone blockers for under 18's and Finland has prioritised psychotherapy over the use of drugs. The proposed ban on conversion therapy commits the Government to a single side in these debates and makes it illegal for health and social care professionals to offer the full range of options. It also makes any discussion about issues of gender and sexuality impossible with young people, even between parents and child, unless the adults involved are totally affirming of the young person's gender and sexual identity.

Experience shows young people can be deeply confused about issues connected to gender and sexual orientation. This confusion is largely being caused by what they are being exposed to in the school environment and in wider culture. This could amount to something akin to 'conversion therapy' where young people are encouraged to think that they may need to change their gender or sexual orientation.

Coercive and abusive behaviour should be caught by existing law. But it is wrong for biblically faithful preaching, prayer, pastoral care and parenting to be in the sights of lawmakers. True 'conversion therapy' comes by sitting under the preaching of Gospel that leads to repentance and faith, and to true personhood as our identity is found in Jesus.

As Convenor of the denomination's Church and Society Committee this is something that has come to my attention. However this issue has far reaching implications that threaten the articulation and teachings of the ancient landmarks of the Christian faith. We should certainly pray for the young people of our land in this time of confusion, and for our leaders that they may see that need for true liberty. Pray also for our church, that we may see more families come and worship with us, with their children.

Thinking about our nation, many of us will be saddened and anxious to hear of the death of our Monarch. We are called to pray for our Monarchs and leaders (1 Timothy 2:1-4). We do need stability in our nation, which is very important in this year of a General Election in the United Kingdom. In Judges 21:25, we read of the confusion that the Children of Israel faced: 'In those days there was no king in Israel. Everyone did what was right in his own eyes.'

We need leadership, discernment and direction. Let us pray for our leaders at all levels, in both the spiritual and temporal kingdoms. Let us be encouraged that Jesus Christ is the same, yesterday, today and forever (Hebrews 13:8).

The Committee of Management

The Temporal Court have addressed the problems with the setting of the granite steps at the front of the church and have continued to undertake work on managing the churchyard. Unlike most churchyards, St Andrew's owns and manages this, rather than in most cases being under Local Authority care and management.

The Fellowship Hall and toilets will be decorated in March and new low energy lighting installed. The fluorescent tube lighting is being phased out, so this is a timely opportunity to change this. It is hoped that these costs will be subsidised from a grant from The Ferguson Bequest Fund. Another Environmental Grant has assisted in procuring equipment for the grounds for maintenance.

The chairs on the chancel and vestibule and some in the vestry have been replaced with very comfortable and durable wooden framed chairs. The new ones on the chancel particularly enhance the appearance of the church. The chairs were from Newbattle Parish Church which has now closed and only cost the congregation £150, which sum has been more than recovered from the sale of the old seats. I am sure that we are all encouraged by the acquisition of the Yamaha Clavinova to assist our praise.

Igoe-up Limited have been engaged to start work from April on the high level areas of the church over three phases. These include:

Scrape all lichen and spray the full spire with biocide.

Carry out a full spire repoint using a sand and lime mortar, after the lichen and algae has been removed.

Repaint the finial using primer followed by 2 coats of block paint.

Repaint all clockfaces using a red oxide primer followed by 2 coats of gloss paint

Remove all bird droppings from the tower. Replace the mesh on all elevations of the tower. Replace the defective roof ridge tile with a new tile.

Fully repoint all drip courses using a sand and lime mortar.

Repaint all the gutters and down pipes.

Repoint the bottom mortar joint of the drip course under the gutter.

The cost of this will be £8,500 in total. Around £750 was raised from the Gift Day and if anyone feels led to contribute to this one -off project, please speak to The Treasurer. We were unsuccessful in our application to the Bellahouston Bequest Fund. However an application to The Baird Trust has been submitted and the Bellshill Protestant Auld Boys Flute Band have arranged an evening of loyal and patriotic music to raise funds for us in the Imperial Club, to which we are thankful.

We are still looking at other benevolent funds to obtain funds. If we are unsuccessful, this will be a huge financial burden on the congregation and we will have to manage funds carefully. In 2023, we had a deficit of around £16,000 on what was largely essential spending, but reserves do not last forever. It is also always good to prayerfully review the giving of our time, talents and money for the work of Christ's church.

Our new First Aiders will be Mrs Betty Houston and Mr Harry Todd, who have previous experience of care in their professional lives. They will be attending an authorised First Aid course soon. We still require people with appropriate Food hygiene certification. Any volunteers should speak to Anita Henery.

Our organist, Ivan Varchenko is organising a concert for late-April and there will be a 'sale of work' in the Imperial Club on a Friday in November. We have found that footfall in Bellshill is very low on Saturday, hence the Friday events.

In terms of personnel, the Committee has had Mrs Eileen Bunch and Mrs Anne Chang-Leng resign and we have lost Jim Russell, our longest standing member. The Minister is now the Preses *pro tem* and Mrs Henery the Clerk *pro tem*. The Committee is seeking persons with the practical skills to manage the fabric and finance, who also have a spiritual understanding of stewardship. Managers, along with Elders, are also charity trustees. Please speak to the Minister if you feel that you may be able to serve in this way.

In the last issue of the Magazine, you will have seen the number of work and items that the Managers and Session would like to procure. It is good to see that list going down a little. Further updates will be given at the AGM.

Jim Russell, a Bellshill man all his days, was a long serving member of St Andrew's Church. Ordained in 1985 into what was St Andrew's Church of Scotland, (linked with Orbiston Church at that time) under the ministry of Rev. C. Greig, he was also a long serving Manager and Preses.

Jim and Marion have given up a lot for St Andrew's Church. From very practical work around the church building to spiritual direction as an Elder, he has served us well and has been a person of continuity in the turbulent years of St Andrew's Church.



Jim brought stability to the Committee of Management and was a strong advocate of returning to the United Free Church of Scotland. Jim was also very involved in the Mens Club and the Boys Brigade.

Jim always offered me sound advice on the work of both courts of the church. He was a diligent visitor to those in his District even in the last months of his life. Indeed, it was a huge shock to us all when we heard of Jim's sudden passing on 21 January, soon after his 86th birthday.

Family was very important to Jim, he loved Marion and what he called the girls, in Christine, Sheena and Norma and their husbands in Shaw, Alan and Fraser, and we also remember Ian who died in infancy. Having had a long life, Jim had the privilege as a grandfather of spending a lot of time with his nine grandchildren, which many grandchildren and grandparents don't have that opportunity. We remember Marion especially at this time and pray for her future care, as well as Jim's beloved 'girls.'
