

Dear Friends,

Like many of you, I have been in many church halls around the country. One of the things that I have noticed is the variety of the styles, length and materials for the hall curtains. Often they simply are old fashioned, too long or short and often not thick enough for warm and visual projection, and often quite well used. Now, we must not be ungrateful for what many have contributed, often sacrificially and in a time of need. However, in our giving to the church, we often focus in our contribution of our time, talents and money not as what is sacrificial, but what we have spare.

In the Old Testament, the Children of Israel were to bring to the Temple their best livestock and crops and the first fruits, or the best, would be for the Lord's work. In the New Testament, the focus on God's salvation plan was that of God the Father giving to mankind, his Son, the most precious gift that He could give for the atonement of mankind's sins.

Being intentional about our giving is what we are called to do in our Christian life. We are commanded to give what is sacrificial, rather than what is spare. In the early Church, we gain a picture in Acts 2 of how these first Christian made conscious changes to worship and educate themselves in the faith, to meet together and to contribute to their church community.

A lot of this would start with self. We have to be willing to be able to attend public worship, subject to works of necessity, even when we don't feel like it. There is no better place to be when we are feeling down than in the Lord's house, worshipping with His people. We also have to learn more about the Christian faith and what this means for us in a secular world where a Christian worldview is very different from a non-Christian worldview. A Sunday morning or evening is not enough to sustain us in maintaining our faith. In addition, Church is not primarily here to meet our wants and tastes, but our needs, which is the Gospel. If we do not feed ourselves, then we easily fall away.

St. Clement of Alexandria, for example, once said, "Calling her children about her, [the Church] nourishes [Christians] with holy milk, that is with the Infant Word. Two Scripture passages come to mind here:

- 1 Peter 2:2, Like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up into salvation.
- Matthew 23:37, "How often would I have gathered your children together as a hen gathers her brood under her wings, and you were not willing!"

In addition, there are other activities run by the United Free Church, such as the Ladies Weekend and The Gathering, the denominational away day, and other Christian events that sustain us in our faith. Intentionally saturating ourselves in God's Word and seeking His ways mean that we give sacrificially, not what is spare.

Many will think that this is a 'begging letter' for cash, but it encompasses more than financial giving. Financial giving is important, we have lost the concept that the Lord's money is raised by the Lord's people and the topic of tithing our time, talents and money. However, this is still a Biblical concept to put into action based on what we have been blessed with. It is not for 'other people' to fund our church; it is primarily for the Lord's people in our context. There is no other central body to pick up the shortfall and also people from other fellowships and non-Christians may bless us with the giving of resources, we cannot always depend on that.

A prayerful intentional, joyful sacrificial giving of our time, talents and finances spring from a saving understanding of the Gospel and results in people being drawn into our midst with discipleship and conversion.

C.S. Lewis once wisely wrote: "I do not believe one can settle how much we ought to give. I am afraid the only safe rule is to give more than we can spare."

The hymn writer Issac Watts wrote in *When I survey the wondrous cross* 'Were the whole realm of nature mine, that were a present far too small; Love so amazing, so divine, demands my soul, my life, my all."

Furthermore, addressing the big issue of motivation, a wise woman was quoted as saying: "If you give what you do not need, it isn't giving."

Jesus Christ said "For what does it profit a man to gain the whole world and forfeit his soul?" (Mark 8:36).

Some questions that we may wish to reflect upon:

Do we intentionally plan to attend the public worship of God and in fellowship in our ways, rather than looking at what time we have to spare?

If we cannot attend worship on the Lord's Day and in the midweek meeting? How arewe seeking to .

meet our spiritual needs?

Is our money spent on our hobbies and interests in balance with our financial giving to the church?

Can we bless our church and be an encouragement to the Lord leadership and an example to others by being present at church activities?

Perhaps these are challenging words in the liberal, sleepy Christian narrative that many of us will be used to, where churches survive because they have a big congregation. However, growing churches, whether in poorer or more affluent areas, all grow from being intentional in their intentional sacrificial giving, and not putting in what is spare.

The Gathering – Saturday 17 August

The Gathering replaced the previous 'Dunblane Day' and is the Denominational Day Conference. The keynote speaker was Rev. Professor Sinclair Ferguson of the Reformed Theological Seminary in the USA. Although he is an academic, his talk and approach has been rooted on pastoral ministry, having served in St John's Baltasound Church in Unst and St George's-Tron Church in Glasgow and in the USA. His talk was on the theme 'We believe in God' and was an accessible talk on the nature. The words 'uplifting' and 'inspiring' are often over-used, however they would be applicable here, along with the most important aspect, clear, accessible teaching from the Scriptures. There were also small group sessions on the following topics in the afternoon: Worship of God, The Work of God in Today's Scotland, Seeing God Through Puritan Eyes, The Servant King (Leadership and Power in the Church), Who we are in Christ: Sexuality and Gender Identity, 'We Believe in Creativity': Mission and Worship Through Creative Practice and Jesus and The Questions of the Age. I would encourage folks from St Andrew's to attend next year, it is a good chance to meet other Christians in our denomination and also others, and to learn more and be discipled in the Christian Faith.

Our Daily Bread

Our Daily Bread is a quarterly booklet with a Bible verse, thought and questions to help us live the Christian life for every day of the year. There are copies in the Fellowship Hall by the Tea Urn, and a sign up sheet so it can be reserved for you when they come in. A suggested donation of £1 per edition can be given to the Treasurer.

D-Day Commemoration Service

The Service to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day was held in the church with an excellent turnout on Sunday 9th June at 6:30pm.

Battle of Bothwell Bridge

The 345th anniversary of the Battle of Bothwell Bridge, was marked by an afternoon service on Sunday 26th May at 3pm. We recall Bellshill's place in the battle: a Covenanter, believed to have been an Ayrshire man, was injured at the Battle of Bothwell Bridge. He managed to escape to a well now located at the modern Gordon Place in Bellshill., but collapsed due to his injuries and exhaustion. He was found by his fiancée, Mary Rae, who nursed him using water from the well.

The Battle of Bothwell Bridge took place on 22 June 1679. It was fought between government troops and militant Presbyterian Covenanters, and signalled the end of their brief rebellion. The battle took place at the bridge over the River Clyde between Hamilton and Bothwell in Lanarkshire, Scotland.

The Committee of Management

There has been a sense of relief that the high-level roof and spire works have been completed by Igoe-Up Limited, who work across a number of churches and historic buildings, including other United Free Church congregations in the central belt. The relief stems from the news that there were no unexpected repairs required the total cost was £9,020 (£500 of which was paid last year for the survey and slate repair). To date, around £5,000 has been raised. No doubt we have all seen the repointing of the spire and the removal of the green vegetation on the spire and the repainted clock faces. The 'tree' growing out of the west side of the belfry is a blessed subtraction! However, a lot of the work is unseen, buit will help to future-proof our building. The Gift Day later in the year will focus on financial gifts towards this project. The majority of the funds have been raised from outwith the congregation from individuals (one giving £1,000 and another £500 respectively), The Bellshill Auld Boys Band and Tunnocks. However, all the smaller donations are gratefully received. Do consider if you are able to contribute, or ask a business that you are connected with if they can make a contribution.



The Fellowship Hall has been re-decorated and new lighting added, along with the toilets. The money spent on this can be claimed back from a pledge of £3,000 from the Fergusson Bequest Fund. The kitchen tap has been replaced. Further work from this wallet will include the installation of dado rail in the Fellowship Hall, replacement lighting in the kitchen and vestry and redecoration of the vestibule.

There are some other major works that are required that will incur extra expense. The Scottish Administration are phasing out fluorescent tube lighting. All of the light fittings in the main church building have been replaced, except for the kitchen, which will be done in due course. The biggest exercise and cost is replacing the fittings in the Neilson Halls with LED (light emitting diode) fittings, around the Bumblebee Nursery schedule.

In addition, tree management works are required in the churchyard as the trees are getting too big and could be dangerous in the future. Further items to address will be new digital screens in the sanctuary, replacement church kitchen units and work on the Manse conservatory to remove rot and replacement of the Manse kitchen. All of these things will be completed in due course with prudent budgeting and grants sought. We are currently in the process of the compulsory land registration and are looking at the Title Deeds for the church estate.

I am hoping that we can add to the number of Managers to help with this work. As Preses on a pro tem (or acting) basis, unfortunately a lot of my time is taken up with temporal (fabric and finance matters) rather than preaching and pastoral ministry and going forward this is unsustainable. I do pray that there will be more labourers in the vineyard to assist in this important work.


