THE ST ALBANS MODEL ENGINEERING EXHIBITION 2015

I arrived at Townsend School, St. Albans (the exhibition venue) before the designated meeting time of 5pm to find that a few members had already arrived and were collecting the tables and placing them in position on the stage in the Main Hall. This year it had been decided to use the school tables so we did not have the task of transporting our own tables from the Club hut to St Albans and back. The table stretchers support boxes and covers were transported there by John Allen thus were available on time so that there was no delay in setting up our stand which was completed by about 6pm. We were also provided with some spot lights (It tends to rather dark up on the stage) this most certainly improved the situation and all the models could now be clearly seen on the tables at the back of the stage.

During the setting up time a steward from the St Albans Club came to see us regarding our time slots for sailing on their artificial pond and we were duly allocated time slots for 3pm on both Saturday and Sunday.

Members had brought a good selection of models with quite a few boats some of which had their navigation and cabin lights illuminated, also some Trucks and Tanks (by John Weedon) Plastic Models (by Tony Martin), and a number of Wood & Card Sculpture Models.

I arrived 9 am Saturday morning to find that Peter Carmen was already there reorganising the layout as some additional display models had arrived. I took a walk around with my camera to see who was there, taking a number of photographs of all the different stands and models that I passed along the way. All the boat Clubs were in the main hall, including us (L&DMBC) being situated up on the stage giving us a grand view of the entire hall.

The Gym was used to house small gauge Model Train layouts, static displays of boats and the gentleman with the Card models of all the ships. The Meccano models had their own room this year which was situated further along the corridor from the Gym.

The back room (school canteen) was devoted entirely to trucks and tanks with two layouts one for the big boys and another, in the corner, for the children. There they could test their skills controlling a truck, this seemed to be very popular.

I wandered out the back of the school to the Sailing Pool. This was organised such that time slots where allotted throughout the day allotted to allow young visitors to test their skills at controlling a model boat, three radio control set-ups were available and this, like the trucks proved to be popular.

The steam trains were all fired up and puffing away giving rides to all the children as normal. Wandering further afield I found the aircraft flying ground, when I got there, late Saturday afternoon they were flying a pair of aircraft with great skill (see picture) amazing they did not hit each other, there was also a RC controlled Air Balloon but this only lifted a metre or so off the ground.

Our allocation for sailing on the pool was 3pm on both days. The first day I sailed my new model of Queen Mary 2 (1/400 Scale which allowed me to take some OTW pictures for the Model Boat Magazine to accompany my article that I had written, I was joined by Pete Carmen with his Tug which seemed to be giving him some problems and Chris Jackson.

The St. Albans Club were not doing their usual judging and presentation of prizes for best models in class etc. However we presented the Roy Davies Trophy for best L&DMBC model in show. Dave Abbott organised some non members to do the Judging and this year it was won by Bob Vaughancongratulations to Bob

Aylesbury is about 1 hour away by car and the car park is 100yds max to the lakeside, although disabled can drive right up to the lakeside. Graham was very happy as he got to sail the club 500 he bought along! Sharon is still being shy about sailing and I think we should all encourage her to sail more often. Let's face it, she cannot be any worse than the rest of us!!!!

BLACK PARK

Well, this is one Open day we go to every year, mainly because it's a fantastic lake with a really good cafeteria, yes I'm going on about food again, but when you are out for a day sailing, it's very important to have toilets and food!!! would be on her plimsoll line, but at battle stations she would flood her internal tanks and got to decks awash, this would mean that literally only the superstructure would be above the waterline! This mode actually incorporates this feature and it has still not been perfected! The second reason is that we all know this actual boat as the Thunderchild from H G Wells story The war of the Worlds.

NOTES ON VENUES AND SHOWS WE ATTEND

I have been asked to do a list of shows etc. that we attend, showing what amenities are available, so here goes!

St Albans Show -

Telford IPMS -

on site disabled toilets and basic cafeteria. Free tea and Coffee for exhibitors, free parking. Entrance for public approx. £4. There is a bring and buy here.

Blackpark Open Day –

Pay and Display car park. About £3 for the day. Disabled toilets and cafeteria around the other side of the lake about a 7 minute stroll away. Food is very good and reasonably priced. Also onsite for the adventurous is Go Ape rope walkways and Segways to hire. Also many walks onto the backlots of Pinewood Studios.

Watermead Open Day Aylesbury – Disabled toilets within 2 min walk, shops about a 5 minute drive away. Ramp way to access water and 2 jetties. A pub is situated about 5 mins away, free parking.

Warwick Model Boat Show – Free parking, and excellent cafeteria, reasonably priced, plus retailers galore to get most of your supplies from!

Deans Marine Open Days – Indoor and outdoor show, put on by Ron. There is a burger van present, free parking and other traders normally. A good day out to go see some of the kits this firm produces. He has an outdoor pool for sailing on as well.

Mobile Marine Open Day – free parking and burger van, no pool as far as I am aware, but several traders also turn up for this event.

Haydock Park – free parking, cafeteria and traders at this show.

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The largest plastic model show in the UK. Parking, some free and some paid. There is an entry fee but not sure how much. Another show where there are lots of traders for modelling items, held over 2 days. You will need 2 days to see the whole show and a small mortgage for your purchases!

Alexander Palace Model Engineering – Free parking, and £9 entry fee. Cafeteria is ok but pricey. This show is mainly for engineering enthusiasts, not much in the way of modelling supplies.

Mayhem at Wicksteed – The show is free of charge, but Wicksteed Park charge for car parking, normally about £6. Free tea and Coffee but any donations go to charity. There are cafeterias around the Park. Plenty of toilets around the park as well, and disabled access to the lake. For those that are foolhardy enough to want too, we camp over the weekend, holding the legendary BBQ and

drinkies on the Saturday night.
